# A BIG ACHIEVEMENT

Congratulations are in order for ex-student from last year, Cameron Kelly and Broden Pollard (ex-Kingston PS from 2015) who were recently in the UK competing in the Maths in Motion Challenge. Cameron and Broden were one of 30 teams in the World Final and the only team who qualified from Australia. The competition started with over 100,000 students worldwide and the 'virtual' car they designed finished 5<sup>th</sup> overall and runner-up in the senior division (12-16 year group – he is 12 and Broden is 13!). The final race was streamed live across the globe via YouTube.

# More about the Challenge

The Jaguar Maths in Motion Challenge has now become well established in the calendars of many schools as a way of engaging children of all ages and abilities in an exciting and motivating mathematics based project. The software is suitable for all ages from 8 upwards. It is an ideal base for a primary school maths project, for a 'transition years' project or for general use with older students throughout secondary school.

The Challenge involves students working together in small teams. These teams set up virtual racing cars and then compete against each other in a series of Grands Prix type races throughout the year in the hope of becoming World Champions. This activity involves a wide range of basic mathematical skills, some practical, being used and applied.

<u>Maths in Motion Grand Prix</u> - Our flagship Challenge involving 100,000 children, globally! This Challenge, for 8 to 16 year olds, has been running since 2000 and is tried and tested. # Activity in the bushland areas around our school

You may have noticed recently that there has been some clearing happening around our school site. Gardeners don't really like to do this but, being a government organisation, we have to ensure that we create and maintain not only visually stimulating grounds around our schools but also that all aspects of our grounds are safe. This involves 5 key areas:

- 1. Supervision site lines. When our kids are outside at morning tea and lunch they are supervised by staff on duty. Government policy requires certain heights of all vegetation, with the exception of tree trunks, to provide the best possible sight lines for staff to supervise our kids and keep them safe.
- 2. Security. Policy requires that all areas of the school be maintained, as best as possible, to minimise the opportunity for potential offenders to hide or gain entry to the school. The same clearing as for sight lines for supervision of the kids achieves this around the school buildings but means that we also need to continue this clearing out to the boundaries of the school site.
- 3. Safety. Our school grounds must be kept in a safe condition for not only our kids but for visitors and staff as well. This means as trees either die or become stressed, they need to be removed or pruned back. We attempt to recycle all trees and shrubs on site. It is EXTREMLY IMPORTANT that if you think there is a safety issue anywhere at the school, to report it at the front desk, where such matters are dealt with in a timely manner.
- 4. Bush Fire. Although the school site is not identified as being in the "Bushfire Prone Area" as determined by the Department of Fire and Emergency Services, many parts of Clifton Park, most particularly around the borders, are included. This obviously puts the school site at risk of ember attack and as such reasonable efforts must be made to reduce the fuel load on site to minimise the effect of any spot fires that may start on site.



5. Tree and shrub Health. Various plant diseases are present on our school site. In some cases we need to remove trees and scrubs because of disease, or stress or are just too leggy. We keep this to an absolute minimum.

# What are our plans for the future?

The intention, once the school grounds have been made safe and compliant, is to start a program of replanting of mainly low growing shrubs and ground covers. This will be done in conjunction with several classes to enhance the learning outcomes in areas that the students would otherwise be doing in theory. This also builds ownership of the school grounds in the students which helps them to value our environment.

Other projects in the very early stages of consideration are a Nature Based Playground, Bush Sculpture and Outdoor Classrooms, all of which you will hear more about in the future.

A major refurbishment of bushland always looks a bit poor immediately after the clearing stage. Please bear with us as this is not the case once follow up mulching and planting development work is completed.

# SAVE THE DATE - SURF TO SURF FUN RUN **SUNDAY 15TH OCTOBER 2017**

The Surf to Surf Fun Run, now in its 40th year, is a popular event for schools, corporates, community groups and anyone who wants to 'have a go'.

Once again we will hold a Fast 5 Schools Challenge and the Handicap Shield. The Fast 5 will be determined by an average of the fastest five students representing their school. The Handicap Shield will be determined by the highest entries per school population. Prizes will be awarded to the Primary and Secondary school with the highest entries per school population = Handicap Shield and the Fastest 5 School Award in both Primary and Secondary categories.
