MRS JOLLIFFE'S JOTTTINGS

The Place of Handwriting in Writing



Learning handwriting can be compared to learning times tables. Just as we know that in mathematics, a good automatic knowledge of the times tables can free up the brain for higher order thinking, the same can be said for handwriting. If it is automatic, children can concentrate on the content of what they are writing instead of focusing on correct letter formation etc.


For an early writer, their mind can be freed up to think of phonics, spelling, punctuation and the message they are trying to convey. If letter formation is laboured and cognitively difficult, the reverse is typically true; the students spelling is typically poor, their punctuation is lacking and the content of their writing can be disjointed or unclear or very brief, rather than lengthy and detailed.

With the learning of times tables, the amount of time devoted to the teaching of this in school each week is generally not enough for students to gain fast automatic recall of the basic number facts. The practising of this at home supports the teaching in class. The same can be said for handwriting. Practice at home can reinforce the correct pencil grip, the starting place for each letter and the direction taken to form the letter.

At Clifton Park PS we use the NSW Foundation Handwriting font. Please see below a copy of this font indicating the correct starting place for each letter. You may find it handy to print this out and use as a reference.

There are many commercial products, both in print and electronic form that can be used to motivate children to practise their writing.

Be careful not to take away the spontaneous desire to write that your child may show by over emphasising correct handwriting. It is a fine balance!

Dear Ms Pockets

t is never too early or late to start educating your kids about managing personal finances. One of the best gifts you can give your children is the financial knowledge they will need to succeed later in life. Parents play an important role in the process of introducing their children to ideas about and attitudes towards money and its uses. It is important to start modelling behaviours, and having talks relating to saving, spending, donating and investing as young people today are interacting with money and making consumer choices from an early age. They are growing up in a society where money is increasingly 'invisible' and the use of online and digital

choices for shopping is creating a new issue of youth debt. The increase of mobile phone usage is also a contributor to youth debt and young people need to be provided with the knowledge to make informed decisions about the way they use money and the impact this has on their future wellbeing.

Pocket money is a great way to start these conversations. Most kids spend money they earn on food, snacks, lollies and toys. A recent survey found just one in three save their pocket money and are not developing the values required to manage their finances.

Some top tips about pocket money and saving include:

- Ask them how much they should get in pocket money, and why? What are the jobs they do worth?
- It is important pocket money is paid conditionally on their job being done.
- Consider the idea of performance pay. In addition to their base pocket money, why not provide incentives for your child by offering to pay for extra work done?
- It's also important not to make it a complete drag. Talk about what they are good at, and what they enjoy, so it entrenches the idea that money is a reward for work and you should work at what you are good at.
- Explain where pocket money comes from. Talk about your income and that the money is used to pay for your house, groceries, clothes, holidays, gifts and their pocket money. It isn't just given to you on a card!
- Negotiate with them the saving versus spending of their pocket money and you will be well on the way to ensuring they develop an understanding of the value of money.

What a great idea she had to open a school bank account, even if a bit confused about its purpose.


